Tree Talk

Burton Village Tree Commission

One of the most difficult questions I am asked is, "How much should I water?" It seems like it should be easy enough - even a child can water - yet lack of water accounts for most tree fatalities in the first year. There is no pat answer. Ten gallons per week applied slowly or sprinkle for one half hour three times a week are neither adequate nor accurate guides in my opinion.

Trees and shrubs generally come one of two ways: ball and burlap (B&B) or in containers. Either way, whatever the plant was used to growing in was probably not the same as the soil in the yardit's planted in. The growing medium was well drained; gardens are often not. The more clay there is, the more water the soil holds. This sets up a situation known as hydrologic discontinuity. That is, water is held differently by different soil types. Often water drains out of the rootball and is held in the outer soil, so one can be mislead into thinking that the plant is well watered when in fact it is parched. This is particularly true of pot-bound container plants. Watering them is like watering a stone.

Amending the backfill with compost or a planting mix does help, but new plants need careful moisture monitoring. We need to touch and be in touch with our plants. Does the plant look droopy even after it's been watered? Dig 2 - 3 inches into the rootball and feel it. Chances are it's dry. Does water sheet off the top of the rootball instead of soaking in? Water more often. And the best way to water is by hand using a wand or nozzle with a shower setting that provides gentle coverage. Wateringcan be meditative, but for those of us with short attention spans, just leave the water on the rootball while weeding or checking the mail, then return and move it to the other side of the plant and keep watering until the rootball is moist. Feel it. Or look for the robins that appear when the soil becomes moist enough to pull worms!

ACH and eBill

How to Check Your Home for a Water Leak:

- ⇒ To check if your toilet is running, simply place several drops of food coloring in the back tank. After 15 minutes, if coloring has entered the toilet bowl, you have a leak.
- → You can furthermore check your entire home for a leak, by turning off all faucets and making sure that the toilet is not running. If everything is off and your meter is moving, you have a leak.

Reminder for the Village Residents:

Household chemicals such as paints, cleaners, automotive fluids, batteries, and pesticides containing hazardous and toxic chemicals could easily be poured down drains, into a storm sewer, on the ground, or even in trash. Please keep in mind, these chemicals can pollute the environment and endanger our health.

Also, a reminder to NOT flush wipes and other things down the toilet that people might use in lieu of toilet paper.

With the onset of warm weather, property owners may be considering improvements or changes to their real estate. Please keep in mind the following if changes are in your plans.

Mayor's Permit

Work necessitating the involvement of a portion of the sidewalk, roadway, water system and/or sewer system within the Village will require a Mayor's Permit through the Village Office. The application includes detailing the nature and method of work, remedial work planned, start and anticipated completion dates.

Utilities Locations

Before doing excavation or work such as digging, ditching, drilling or leveling, please call the Ohio Utilities Protection Services at 1-800-362-2764 and the Village Utilities Department at 834-1408 to locate utility lines by the property. This will help prevent potentially costly repairs to village infrastructure.
